Lost & Found in the Highland Cemetery by Paul Kelly & Linda Perrotto

One of the great pleasures and frustrations of Volkswalks is coming to a turn in the instructions and somehow missing it. Of course it is frustrating, because you go off path and often have no idea how to get back on path; even more so, if you later discover that the instructions were clear and you just misread them.

Such was the case at the entry point to the Highland Cemetery on the Norwood Soup Walk on April 16, 2016. Linda and I were lucky to take the indicated turn, but a hundred meters along the path we saw that Volkswalkers were scattered across the grounds like ants, but this observation only led us to uncertainty whether we ourselves were heading correctly. Still, we marshalled on and came to the intersection of St. Paul Avenue and Cemetery Avenue, where we found Blanche, a trim woman wondering what direction to take next (and looking a little frustrated). Blanche walked with us for most of the rest of the route.

Now we come to the pleasures of misdirection. Our conversation with Blanche was delightful. It turned out that Blanche was raised in Roslindale, where Linda and I live, only a few blocks from our house. She recalled the sights and sites she grew up with, some long gone, like the Rialto theater, and some transformed, like the shops at the corner of Iona and Belgrade, to which she would

walk down the hill on Iona Street and buy foodstuffs and candy (today there is a pizza shop, Winnie's Skin Care Salon, and across the street an auto repair shop, a yoga studio, and a shabby row of stores now closed).

Blanche told us that she had recently moved to Norwood after 53 years of living in Anchorage, Alaska, which she explained is not so cold as Linda imagined. As we walked, she pointed out the features on our route. We remember most vividly the Norwood Memorial Municipal Building, whose Gothic Revival face glinted in the sunlight, and the massive school building, now medical offices, where she first taught after her graduation from Boston State College (at which, coincidentally, Linda worked in the late 70s and early 80s). Blanche also gave us succinct reviews of the restaurants on Washington Street as we passed through Norwood Center and brief praise of her apartment building, which we also passed by.

What a remarkable discovery for us was Blanche! Almost any Volkswalk offers surprises, unexpected views, gardens, buildings, connections. In our companion we found someone who had connected to her surroundings all her life and now was connecting us.

Shelburne Falls Seasonal Event – We thank Jan and Bob Varnon for spearheading the opening of the seasonal event in Shelburne Falls on May 1 (and thanks to NERD Betty Green for expediting the sanctioning process). The 10K and 5K routes feature the Bridge of Flowers over the Deerfield River, the picturesque downtown, the Trolley Museum and neighboring town of Buckland. No matter in which season you travel here from May to the end of October, the plantings on the Bridge of Flowers will entice you to slow down and enjoy the colors, scents and views. Club Marathon Challenge Program – With a good one-mile stretch going from

The start point is Jack's Abby Brewery and Beer Hall Restaurant in their new location on Clinton Street in Framingham. Details will be forthcoming. Since 2012 when the program began, as promised, there have been at least two events in each of the eight towns that comprise the Boston Marathon route. We heard that there are a few people who still
