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Trail Master's Diary: Hyannis

If you're heading to the Walk 'n Mass sponsored Northeast Region Weekend on Cape Cod, check out the special Hyannis walk to be offered on Saturday and Sunday, May 20 and 21.

Many of us have walked and are familiar with the traditional Hyannis YRE. The special added route for Northeast Region weekend takes walkers to different areas for a chance to explore more of the town. The first loop is 6km that goes through residential areas along the harbor. The second loop is a 4km route that travels through commercial areas and completes the 10km for walkers who want that distance.

The first loop heads toward Cape Cod Hospital and the Hyannis Park residential area along Hyannis Harbor and Lewis Bay. Walkers can catch glimpses of the water between the houses as they walk along. Or they can take a

quick detour down one of the public Right of Ways for a better look. There's also a good view of the water as the route heads down Sea Robin Road before traveling through more residential areas. The loop continues to Route 28 before ending at the Comfort Inn start point for the 6km and checkpoint for 10km participants.

The 4km commercial loop takes walkers through downtown Hyannis, passing shops and restaurants. It continues past the Hyannis Youth and Community Center, a year-round indoor sports complex featuring 2 ice rinks. Walkers then pass through more residential and commercial areas before heading back to the Comfort Inn to finish up the 10km route.

Join Walk 'n Mass for the Northeast Region Cape Cod Weekend and explore a different side of Hyannis with 6km and 10km routes on May 20 and 21.

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Block Island Group Walk on June 3

Connecticut Valley Volkssport Club hosting Group Walk on Block Island, Washington County, RI — Saturday, June 3 at 1:00 pm.

If you'd like to walk with others - or just use this date as an incentive to travel on that day and then walk on your own – plan on arriving on Block Island to start the walk from the ferry terminal by 1pm. Look for the CVVC feather banner on Water St. next to Esta's Park upon debarkation. In-person registration will be available here between 10:00 and 1:00 on this day (or register in advance using the Online Start Box process).

There are two separate volkswalk routes offered on Block Island by CVVC: Island Highlights (5K and 11K) and Rodman's Hollow Nature Walk (12K). The group walk at 1:00 pm will be of the Island Highlights route.

The Block Island Ferry's main ferry terminal, which services the traditional ferry and seasonal Hi-Speed ferry, is located out of the Narragansett, RI location—commonly referred to as Pt. Judith. Traditional ferry travel time is approximately 55 minutes.

Passenger tickets can be purchased online in advance (blockislandferry.com) or at the ticket window on the date of travel as space allows. Online tickets are available for purchase up until midnight the previous calendar day. Foot passengers generally don't require reservations early in the season, but, for peace of mind, you might want to get reservations for both directions.

Schedule and fares from Pt. Judith for the traditional ferry on Saturday, June 3, 2023 that align with the group walk timeline are as follow:

Depart Pt. Judith: 9:00 am, 11:00 am

Depart Block Island: 3:00 pm, 5:00 pm, 7:00 pm

Same day round-trip fare: Adult \$21.60; Senior (65+) \$20.60) and Children (age 5-11) \$9.30. (See website for schedule and fares at other times of the year.)

All parking for the Pt. Judith ferries are conveniently located, within walking distance, directly across the street from the ferry. All lots are independently owned, and pricing ranges from \$5-\$15/day, depending on season.

Pre-registrations for the walk events are also due by May 1. However, <u>you may register in</u> <u>person for the Hyannis YRE, the Hyannis tradi-</u> <u>tional event, and the Provincetown SE</u>—and return your start cards/get IVV books stamped for these events—during the staffed start/finish times at the Comfort Inn-Hyannis on that weekend: Friday 6pm–8pm; Saturday 8am– 11am and 3pm–5pm; Sunday 8am–3pm.

RI County Challenge — co-sponsored by Connecticut Valley Volkssport Club (CVVC) and Walk 'n Mass Volkssport Club.

Books to track your progress in walking one volkswalk in each of the 5 counties in Rhode Island can be purchased through me at traditional events, by mail, or by arrangement for delivery at a group walk. Cost is \$10 and the award upon completion (other than personal satisfaction and bragging rights in completing this challenge) is a navy blue cooling towel imprinted in white with the Challenge logo (designed by Bob McDougall).

See a program info flyer on our website (walknmass.org) for the list of qualifying events in RI that are currently available—one in each of the five RI counties—so this challenge is readily doable.
